Response to the Consultation on the Vision and Values Statement

(It should be clearly understood that any name listed below, is not intended to be personal in nature ; comments are aimed at the positions held by the individuals)

Excerpts from three pertinent articles of the Quebec Education Act :

Article 168: *"....a question period must be provided at each public meeting during which the persons present may put oral questions to the commissioners."*

Article 175: *"....This section must not be construed so as to restrict the freedom of speech inherent in a commissioner's function."*

Article 177: *"...they (commissioners) must also act with honesty and loyalty and in the interest of the school board AND the population served by the school board."*

Some history

Former chairperson Suanne Stein Day was found guilty by the Ethics Commissioner of violating the board's Code of Ethics three times and breaking a rule of the Education Act. (Article 177.1)

On Nov. 14, 2017, Noel Burke was named chairman of the Lester B. Pearson School Board by 15 fellow commissioners. He spoke to the press.

He pledged : *"...to follow procedure with a firm commitment to transparency and accountability" and "Good, open, honest, transparent governance is the name of the 'game' for us."*

Perception of the LBPSB today

Even though the LBPSB prides itself as a board that works in "An atmosphere of openness, honesty, integrity and accountability," the following information suggests otherwise.

Consider:

In a Globe and Mail opinion piece on April 23, 2017, *"The jig is up for Canada's school boards,"* the LBPSB was identified as being dysfunctional which has *"been plagued by the same apparent inability of grown adults to act their age."*

In April 2018, former long-time chair of the LBPSB, who was also president and later executive director of the Quebec English School Boards Association, Marcus Tabachnick , wrote in three different English papers:

" Some of the English school boards have suffered through several years of political unrest, internal turmoil and disruptive squabbles with employees, the public and the media.

There seems to be a lack of clear, coherent leadership." ... Then he went on to single out the Pearson board:

"Our self-proclaimed 'open and transparent' boards seem more closed than ever. A recent example is the appointment of a commissioner at one of the boards. (LBPSB)

In the past, that appointment process was transparent. All those vying for the position were known, meet-the-candidates debates were webcast and encouraged questions from the public via a live blog. None of that occurred this time."

LBPSB - not cooperative with other English boards

The Pearson board was asked twice by the EMSB to support pertinent resolutions.

Last year, the EMSB passed a resolution calling for the Education Department to honour the diverse linguistic and cultural history of Quebec minorities in the new history program. The LBPSB reportedly said: "LBPSB okay with history course...there are no complaints." (Feb 6, 2017).

In late May 2018, the EMSB requested all English boards to unite and ask the government to ease up on the rules on access to English schools. (Article 59 of the Charter)

On May 28, I asked the Pearson board, in writing and verbally, to support this reasonable request, which calls for fair and equal treatment of immigrants who become Canadian citizens.

This support would not have cost the taxpayer one penny, still the LBPSB basically refused. In fact, the mic was switched off, by the chair, at the 39:57 mark, right in the middle of my (EMSB) request.

LBPSB disrespects Parents' Committee and Pearson community

In November 2017, the SWLSB and the LBPSB had to fill vacant commissioners' seats . The law calls for parents to be "consulted." At the SWLSB things were done in a very transparent manner.

At the LBPSB the exact opposite - very secretive.... Reportedly " Parents voiced contempt ." ...Seven months later , we still don't know what is the board's policy on the matter.

On the Democracy front :

Successive Pearson chairmen have silenced me from speaking at Public Question Periods at Council meetings ... Madame Stein Day not only silenced me from speaking for 35 months but also silenced, by threatening legal action, well-intentioned Lester B. Pearson school board commissioners who were elected by 11,431 taxpaying voters in the November 2014 elections.

Even though Article 175.1 of the Education Act makes reference to, "the freedom of speech inherent in a commissioner's function," Suanne Stein Day managed to reportedly spend up to \$80,000 for legal fees to hide the fact that she, basically, disrespected the people whose job is to take care of our children throughout the school year. Not one commissioner complained.

In keeping with a similar approach, Chairman Burke wrote in June 2017 that he " would *start a process*" by which I would "*be banned from Council meetings - not just from speaking but banned from council meetings...this may be your last appearance...*"

On the Media:

Connected to the secretive way the LBPSB dealt with the matter of a vacant commissioner seat , the following resolution was passed on December 18, 2017:

" 3.1.1 - Motion in support of the formal complaints of the Chair of Council to the Editor of The Suburban newspaper and to the Association of Journalists.

IT WAS MOVED BY Commissioner C. Berger AND UNANIMOUSLY RESOLVED: THAT the formal complaints of the Chair of the Council of Commissioners of the Lester B. Pearson School Board to the Editor of The Suburban newspaper and to the relevant Association of Journalists, regarding repeated misrepresentations of the Council and the Parents' Committee meetings, be endorsed by Council.

Vote: 17 in favour - None opposed - No abstentions - CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY"

The aforementioned motion is nothing more than a cheap, bullying tactic used by the board to intimidate the media. The board never carried out its threat to take a fake complaint to the "Association of Journalists."

The Suburban reporter in question had attended Council , Executive Committee and Parents' Committee meetings - and so did I. His stories adhered to standards of journalistic integrity while the board lacked political courage to deal with this long-standing issue .

RECOMMENDATIONS

There will be a provincial election held on Oct. 1, 2018. In the event the present government is re-elected, the LBPSB should: Scrap its membership to the QESBA and

Develop a new Code of Ethics which would include these points:

- a citizen cannot be banned for more than a month from participating at Public Question Periods of Council meetings.

- a chairman or commissioner found guilty by the Ethics Commissioner of violating the board's Code of Ethics and/or breaking the rules of the Education Act, should immediately resign.

We should set an example considering Lester B. is the only board in Quebec that has student commissioners.

To that end, since I am the only Anglo acting solely as an individual, who submitted consultation briefs to the National Assembly's Committee on Culture and Education on Bills 86 and 105 (school board reform ; Bill 166 (school tax), and Bill 185 (school board election postponement), I am offering a Commencement Address of sorts as part of this Consultation on Vision and Values.
